Basic About the Luggage Size Guide

Suitcases usually come in sizes with dimensions ranging from 18 inches to 32 inches. Typically anything up to 22 inches is considered suitable for carrying on board as hand luggage. Anything larger, than that, is generally classified as checked-in baggage.

However, some airlines grant permission for more oversized items inside their cabins and may even accept a **23**" suitcase size as a carry-on!

Many suitcase collections offer a selection of three or four sizes, typically 21", 25", 28", and sometimes 31"—however, not an absolute rule since sizes may vary by brand.

For instance, you may come across suitcases that are not included in the size options mentioned earlier. On the other hand, you might face difficulty finding any suitcase under 25 inches, with brands.

Luggage size guide: Carry-Ons and Personal Items

Travelers have the convenience of storing their carry-on bags in the overhead bin of an airplane or, in the trunk of a car. While rolling suitcases are commonly used for this purpose, duffel bags, garment bags, and other types of baggage that meet airline size restrictions also fall into this category.

Weight and Size Requirement for a Personal Item

The luggage that you can carry onto the plane without checking it in is called hand luggage. Airlines often provide information, about the dimensions, of personal items.

Still, generally speaking, these should measure between **10-14 inches in height**, **6-9 inches in width**, and **17-18.5 inches** in length so they can **easily fit under the seat**.

Airlines tend to be careful when it comes to providing measurements considering that different aircraft have amounts of space available, beneath each seat.

Weight and Size Requirement for Carry-Ons

Airlines have various specifications for what can be considered a "carry on", with the most common size being 22 x 14 x 9 inches. However, typically they will range from 8-10 inches in width, 13-15 inches in height, and 19-23 inches in length.

This diversity is because of the varying sizes of aircraft cabins' overhead compartments.

When preparing for a flight it's crucial to be mindful of the weight restrictions, for your carry-on baggage. While certain American airlines don't have regulations on carry-ons ons there are others, budget airlines, that may have their own guidelines and requirements, for weight limits.

Typically you'll notice that many local businesses tend to have restrictions, on the weight of carry-on bags ranging from 15 to 35 pounds (7. 16 kilograms). Moreover, certain airlines may also impose limits on the weight of both items brought on board by each traveler.

International Carry-Ons vs Domestic Carry-Ons

When you're looking to buy a carry-on bag it's important to take note of whether it's labeled as suitable, for "or "domestic" travel. This distinction matters because international flights tend to have stricter size regulations compared to flights.

If you're flying domestically, **your 23-inch** (longest side) bag will likely fit in airline requirements; however, if you plan to traverse internationally, opt for something smaller such as **19 to 21 inches** long.

When you're traveling within your country its generally allowed to bring a carry-on compared to when you're flying overseas.

However, if your luggage doesn't meet the size requirements, for travel you might be required to check it in and face fees. To prevent any inconvenience we suggest getting a bag that adheres to the TSA guidelines. $22 \times 14 \times 9$ inches or smaller.

Checked Baggage

"Checked luggage" is a term used to describe any luggage that's too large or heavy to be carried on the airplane and needs to be checked in. Don't assume that just because it won't fit in the overhead bin you can't bring it with you.

Anything from golf clubs to a box of items that don't **pass carry-on size restrictions** is considered checked luggage and will be stored securely during your flight, so no need to worry!

Not suitcases, Various kinds of baggage can be utilized as checked luggage. This includes trunks, duffel bags, totes, musical instruments, in their cases, and other substantial items that are all considered means of transportation.

Size and Weight Limits for Checked Luggage

When it comes to domestic and international flights, **62 inches is the common standard** for checked bag size.

The most typical size and weight restrictions for checked bags are **62 linear inches** (height + width + length) and **50 or 70 pounds**.

If your luggage exceeds a size there might be charges. However, it's important to consider the weight, as that could also cause issues. To make sure your suitcases meet all the criteria calculate the combined length, width, and height of each piece of luggage to determine its linear dimension before checking it in!

When you're flying it's important to be aware of the weight restrictions, for checked luggage. Many domestic airlines typically allow a weight of 50 pounds per bag. However, some budget carriers such as Allegiant and Spirit Airlines might have a limit of 40 pounds. On the hand, if you're traveling internationally Norwegian Air and Korean Air offer an allowance of up to 70 pounds, for your baggage!

Sizes of Checked Luggage

When checking luggage, travelers are typically presented with three size options; small (23-24 inches), medium (25-27 inches), and large (28-32 inches). Ensuring your suitcase meets these dimensions can help ensure a stress-free check-in experience.

For most travelers, a **medium-sized check bag is ideal** for their needs. Not only does it perfectly comply with airline size regulations, but it also provides an abundant amount of storage space to accommodate all your belongings.

Fees for Checked Luggage

With most international flights, you can bring one or two checked bags at no cost. But domestic airlines may offer no free checked luggage or just a single bag depending on the airline company.

Want to bring more than just a carry-on? American Airlines will charge you based on the number of bags you have, with fees increasing per bag. For **domestic flights**, your first checked bag **costs \$30**, the **second is \$40**, and the third comes at an additional **\$100**.

Linear inches are the second unit of measurement. A checked bag must measure **no more** than 62 linear inches in length, breadth, and depth. The term "linear inches" simply refers to the sum of these dimensions. Therefore, measure the **height**, breadth, and depth separately and sum them all up to get the linear inches.
